



HOW WOULD YOU DRAW **CANADIAN IDENTITY?**

New temporary exhibit *Canada's Self Portrait* opens at the Canadian Museum of Immigration at Pier 21

Sketch what it means to be Canadian. That's the challenge that artist Aquil Virani and cofounder Rebecca Jones gave to over 800 project participants from across Canada on their 2014 coast-to-coast trip. Whether positive or negative, stereotypical or profound, Virani spent more than 200 hours stylizing every single doodle into a unified-yet-varied representation of Canadian identity. As the winner of the **2016 Applied Arts Conceptual Illustration award**, this artwork now headlines the new temporary exhibit, *Canada's Self Portrait*, at the Canadian Museum of Immigration at Pier 21 in Halifax.

"Our goal was to deepen the conversations about what we stand for as Canadians," Virani explains, "while spreading the simple joy of drawing." The 20-minute documentary, funded by an *Indiegogo* campaign, takes viewers on the entire journey across Canada from conception to reality with an optimistic conclusion about Canada's future. "Our identity is not just about who we are, but also who we want to be. We can acknowledge our troubled past, accept our imperfect reality and move forward with our collective goals and shared values in mind."

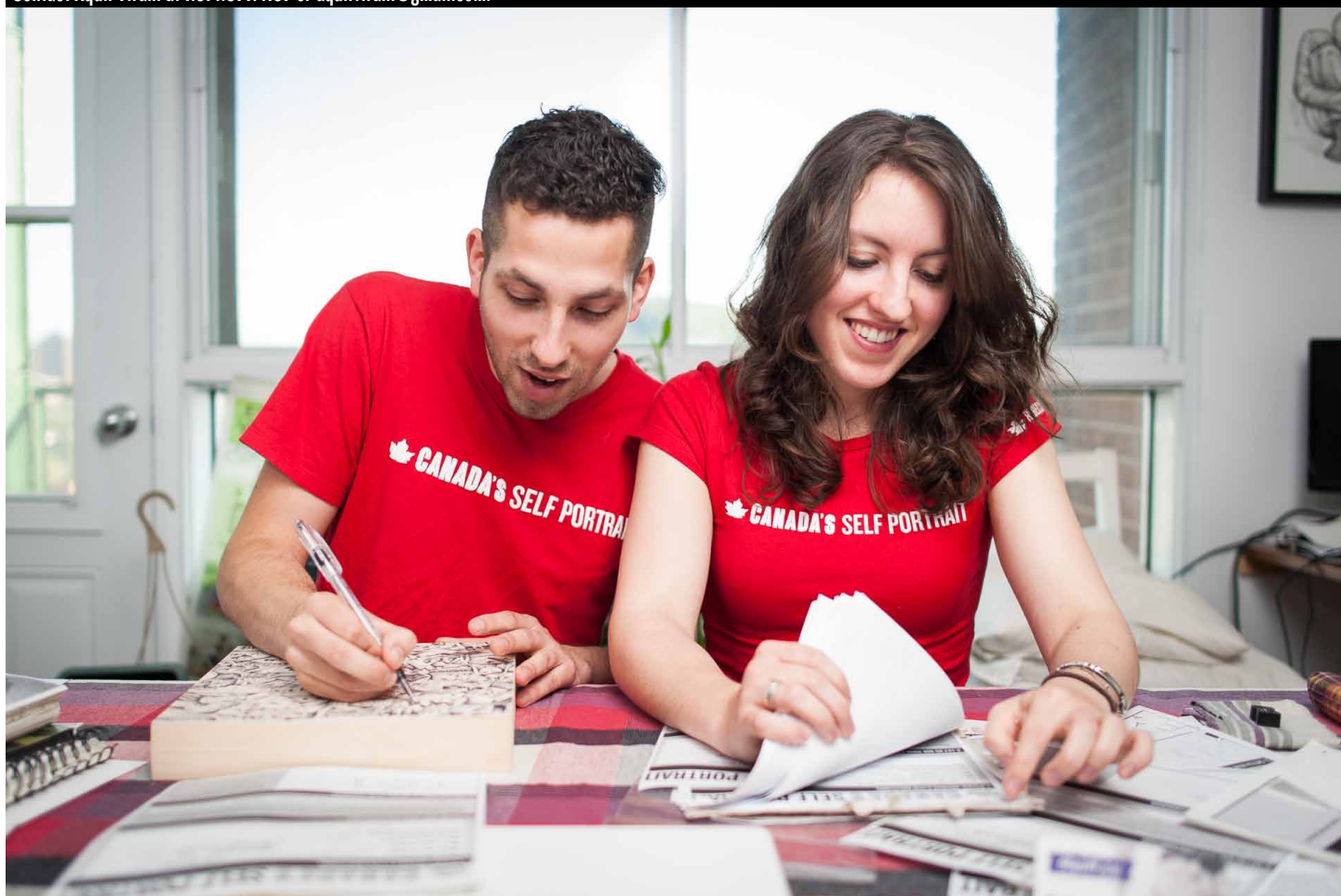
The final presentation of *Canada's Self Portrait* includes the main artwork, selected participant submissions, photographs from the coast-to-coast trip, and supplementary drawings and paintings, in addition to a short documentary film. *It's a rich exploration of all that Canada has to offer.*

VISUAL ARTIST

Aquil Virani is a visual artist and graphic designer based in Montreal. He has been called “the people’s artist” because of his emphasis on accessible art practices; he often creates live, participatory artworks that directly integrate public contributions. His creative projects have taken him to cities throughout the world (New York, London, Punta Cana, Toronto, Boston, Ottawa, Montreal), having been featured consistently by the CBC, Global News, CTV, NPR, La Presse, Breakfast Television, and many other media platforms. It is Virani’s diverse upbringing that informs his focus on inclusion and social issues. He was born in Vancouver to a Catholic mother from France and an Ismaili Muslim father of Indian descent. He believes that we are all artists at heart and that we can all experience the joy he feels when creating. Aquil Virani is driven by a desire to communicate important ideas in an accessible and engaging way.

She now devotes her time to local community organisations with extensive experience developing and facilitating workshops on sexual health and human rights. 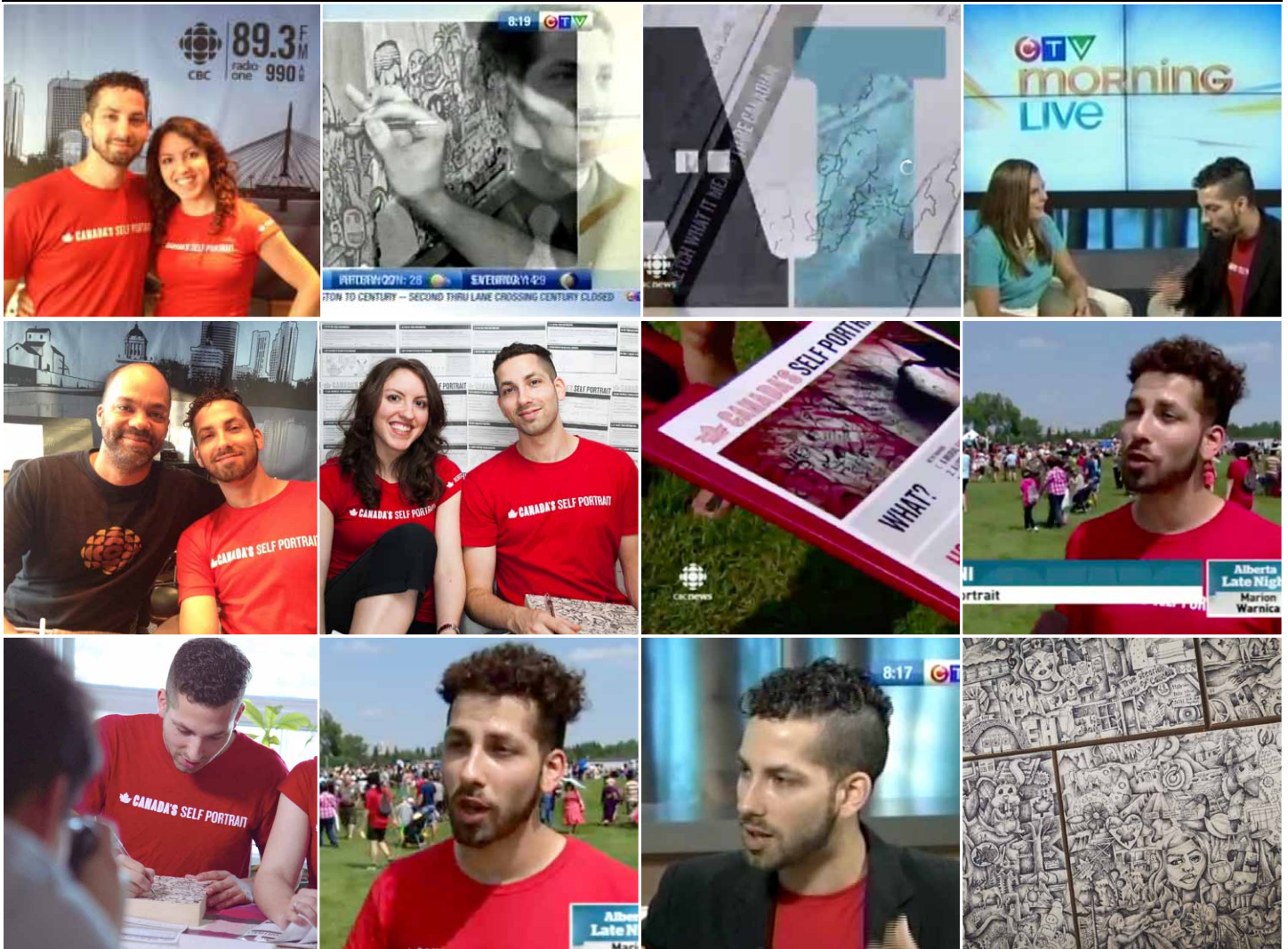
THIS IS WHAT I BELIEVE IN.

In 2012, Montreal's Leacocks Magazine called me "the people's artist." And even though that statement is a bit grandiose, it does clearly describe my mission as an artist - **to create accessible, collaborative artwork** that includes the contributions of the public and re-ignites the joy of art in everyone.

I engage with project participants who might not consider themselves as "artists" to battle the pretentiousness often associated with visual art. It frustrates me that the fear of not getting something perfect and the feeling of not understanding art have stolen the joy of art-making from many people who once loved to create. Art is a powerful tool that should be accessible to all. We are all artists.

Collaborative artwork is not only a way to communicate complex ideas, it's also a way to explore a topic and provide a platform for a wide array of perspectives. Canada's Self Portrait is the ultimate collaborative artwork. 800+ Canadians feeling empowered as artists, exploring the important issue of who we are and what we stand for as Canadians.
